CIBJO's Responsible Sourcing Guidance: Objectives

To support CIBJO members, esp. manufacturers, distributors and retailers.

To protect the reputation of the industry.

To align CIBJO with international guidance and standards.

To reinforce CIBJO's advancement of the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

To fulfil a “Duty of Care” on jewellery supply chains.

To provide simple guidance for the industry to apply supply chain due diligence.





Challenges for CIBJO's Responsible Sourcing Guidance

Fragmented, diverse and multi-layered global supply chains.

Differing levels of supply chain sophistication, role of SMEs.

Role of artisanal sourcing, emerging ASM guidance and standards.

Recognise not all supply chains can comply with existing standards.

Recognise guidance as a “road map” and a process of continuous improvement.

CIBJO provides education and guidance, not standards.

Responsible Sourcing online toolkit	In development





Core elements of CIBJO Responsible Sourcing Policy

Have a Responsible Sourcing policy for your company.

Communicate your policy to your suppliers and customers.

Do “due diligence” on your supply chain to identify any risks.

Have “Know Your Counterparty” procedures in place.

Have a policy to prohibit bribery and money laundering.

Include respect for Human Rights in your policies.

Represent and disclose all products accurately.

Consider certification organisations.
